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

Coventry Foundation Explainer

Editor's Note: This "Coventry Corner" article appeared in the December 2021 issue of the Jaguar Club of Pittburgh's Newsletter. Our club, North Georgia Jaguar Club, is also a financial supporter of the Coventry Foundation and the technical scholarship mentioned in the article.

As members of JCOP are now well aware, the Coventry Foundation was formed some years ago to be the primary source for information and materials related to the heritage of Jaguar Cars in North America. It has been approved by the Internal Revenue Service as an approved Charitable Organization pursuant to Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Gary Kincel of JCOP is the Chairman of the Board of the Coventry Foundation.

With the Holiday Season upon us, your Liaison is pleased to provide snippets of a lengthy interview he conducted of Gary Kincel some weeks ago on November 6 when they visited Dan Fowler's amazing FAST Company premises in Glenshaw, PA. And in the spirit of full disclosure, Gary chose to drive his 1980 Ferrari 308 GTSI that gorgeous Saturday morning since he needed to give it some road time since he had been exercising his Jaguars frequently enough

Stu Benson: "It seems as though this has been a most special year for the Coventry Foundation, or is that just my impression?"

Gary Kincel: "The Coventry Foundation has been growing and serving the Jaguar community now for years and every year - due to our volunteers, Board of Directors, and donors — the Foundation has become more than just a name to people but a respected resource of preserving "All Things Jaguar" that has preserved so many collectible things" that otherwise would have been lost or discarded, let alone possibly be lost to history.

This year of 2021 has, however, been a very special year in part because of the huge response to the Open House we held at the Coventry Foundation premises in Columbia, SC in conjunction with the JCNA Annual General Meeting this past August. That weekend allowed so many wonderful supporters to experience in person the huge collection of so many things related to the Jaguar marque and to be there and interact in person with the Directors of the Foundation and other fellow Jaguar aficionados such that the feedback we have received has just been superb."

Stu: "Speaking of the Directors, Dave Gamret and I enjoyed meeting them when we were in Columbia for the AGM. Tell us a bit about them."

Gary: "All of the Directors are volunteers, starting with the inimitable George Camp, the President of the Coventry Foundation. George is simply an amazing man and knows as much, or more, about Jaguars than almost anyone else I know. He is who has operated the

Tool Loan Program for many years for the Coventry Foundation to benefit JCNA members and George rarely has a day where hours go by without receiving telephone calls from people all over North America — even from other continents — seeking his diagnostic, mechanical, or other advice to help solve an issue involving their Jaguar. One could write many articles about George but anyone who has met him, or spoken with him, knows what I am saying.

Tom Wright, our Legal Counsel, is a wonderful man and full of knowledge and great advice as are fellow Directors Dick Maury, Tom Krefetz, Amos Kunkle (who is our Treasurer), Gary Hagopian, Jim Sanbold (who is our Secretary), and Cynthia Touchton and Gary Vaughn (who is the Liaison of the Coventry Foundation to JCNA). Of course, you also met and spent time with Expert Advisors Mike Dale and Bob Tullius when you and Dave were here. We also have many volunteers that are a pillar of how the Coventry Foundation is able to operate, including their handling all the purchases people can make of things the Foundation is able to sell on eBay to help generate operating income. Of course, the only things that are sold on eBay involve duplicate product of which the Foundation has many other examples that are maintained and not to be sold.

I could go on and on about the efforts of our volunteers since the Foundation could not exist without

their continuing dedicated efforts. Their bios are on the Coventry Foundation website that is now linked to the JCOP website. You have already written about Mike Dale and Bob Tullius."

Stu: "I did enjoy meeting the Directors, as did Dave Gamret. As with anyone who gets to interact with folks over a limited timeframe, one tends to remember most those with whom they enjoyed a drink or a meal. I found Dick Maury an especially knowledgeable and most pleasant fellow who was willing to share "secrets of the trade" in terms of E-Type questions I had for him during both lunch and dinner at Saturday's AGM.

Dave and I enjoyed the time with Amos Kunkle, following your introducing him to us during the cocktail hour before the AGM Saturday dinner and with his living

in Bethlehem, PA and his suggesting JCOP perhaps schedule an event with the Susquehanna Valley Jaguar Club (of which our own Bryan and Candy Williams are members) and the Delaware Valley Jaguar Club. Dave and I got to spend an evening with George Camp and his son Josh, as well as Josh sitting with us at the Friday night dinner at the facility next door to the Coventry Foundation. Everyone we met left us with an indelible impression. Thank you for going out of your way to make these introductions."

Gary: "It was not only my pleasure but I feel it is my obligation to help as many Jaguar owners

and fans "connect" with each other since it is these relationships that not only lead to friendships but open doors in so many ways that can benefit so many others. You have previously written in Coventry Corner about our endowed scholarship at the Pennsylvania College of Technology in Williamsport, PA where this University provides the ability to major in automotive restoration. We are now on our way to raising funds to endow a second scholarship since it is future generations that will be needed to maintain the passion — and service the Jaguars — that we all enjoy. What I would like to do is convey a Holiday Season message of appreciation to all the donors to the Coventry Foundation.

Clubs like JCOP – which was one of the very first Jaguar Clubs to financially support the Coventry Foundation and continues to be one of the clubs in North America that unfailingly provides financial support annually to the Foundation – are so important and are so appreciated that this is the reason the Coventry Foundation established the Liaison program in 2020 where each member club that has historically supported the Coventry Foundation financially (and of which we continue to hope to gain more and more clubs doing so) have been asked to appoint a Liaison representative

to the Coventry Foundation where periodically we conduct Zoom meetings with these Liaisons that are throughout the US, Canada, and Mexico.

This allows for the dissemination of information at one time as well as the Liaisons sharing ideas, feedback, and information with all of us as a group. This crossfertilization" of information has proven to be beneficial for all concerned. Indeed, you having been appointed as the JCOP Liaison by Pete Galinowski in 2020 commenced the friendship that you and I now have developed with so many things in common with which we both enjoy. And the Coventry Foundation appreciates the Coventry Corner articles you author in the Jaguar Jargon, of which I have shared various of them with your fellow Liaisons throughout North America."

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Stu: "Can you share, in a nutshell, upcoming plans of the Coventry Foundation?"

Gary: "As you can imagine, just keeping the lights on, maintaining and expanding our service to the Jaguar community, and dealing with donations of automobiles and anything else Jaguar is like a full time job for most of us affiliated with the Foundation. In terms of our long range plan, what is needed is the Coventry Foundation obtaining its own large building headquarters since we are running out of space in our leased premises in Columbia, SC and that is being charitable that we truly have real "open" space remaining.

It is important we properly care for any donation received utilizing archival standards and displays. All of this costs money, even utilizing volunteers. So getting our own building is more than important. And once we can have our own building in one part of the United States then we will want to perhaps seek our own building in other location(s). Right now we have locations in Columbia, SC as well as satellite locations in California (library and tools) as well as the British Sports Car Hall of Fame in Petersburg, VA.

Moreover, the Coventry Foundation has been provided with so many accolades that the Foundation

has been approached by owners and fans of other British marques to see if the Coventry Foundation would consider expanding its reach to help other non-Jaguar British makes move along the same path we have taken.

While this is an interesting proposition — not to mention it would make a lot of sense in many ways - the decision in terms of any expansion comes down to donors willing to support a new, dedicated building we would own or be able to use long term without negative financial risk and sufficient financial wherewithal to operate the facility before we could consider taking on other British marques. Both of such endeavors could provide new sources of money and people-power. Maintaining, and expanding our donor base is important for any really large donors to see before they

would "jump in the pool" with us. Time will tell but we are most enthusiastic and optimistic that with all the Coventry Foundation has achieved so far that we have only scratched the surface when we will look back a decade from now.

But first and foremost the Foundation is not going to lose sight of its current mission that focuses on Jaguar and it never will stray from that commitment and there will never be any commitment that relegates Jaguar to being other than "the top cat". It takes a train a long time to get going to speed and we feel that the Coventry Foundation now has shown to the world it has that momentum to keep it going, get up mountains,

and reach for the summit in the world of our role in automotive, and Jaguar, history. We believe that as our "train" stops at stations along the way that more and more people will be getting on board with us and there may be room for more than just Jaguar, just like there have been - and are — many British marques that have always coexisted with and never diminished Jaguar. We look forward to seeing how far this Jaguar "train" takes us!!"

When the Premier Auto Group was formed, I was appointed Liaison Manager. My job was to coordinate remarketing sales efforts of the four manufactures' used car fleets. This included large volumes of company service vehicles, repurchased rental car fleets, as well as reacquired and repossessed vehicles.

Shortly after my appointment, I visited Jaguar's corporate offices in Coventry as well as the various manufacturing plants in England. At the same time, I was aware of the legendary E-Type, which continues to be on display at the Museum of Modern Art in New York. When it was introduced,

Enzo Ferrari is reported to have said "The E-Type is the most beautiful car in the world."

I began to develop a personal interest in the Jaguar heritage. I was peripherally involved as Jaguar and Ford attempted to emulate the mystique of the legendary E-Type with the introduction of the XK8. It is my opinion they succeeded and in fact it represents the high water
