


Fall Drive Saturday, November 8th

Whye Do Those Brits Spell Wordes the Waye Theye Do?

It has often been said that the US and UK are two countries separated by a common language. This was brought home to me while browsing in the Norcross shop "The Taste of Britain" during the Atlanta British Car Fayre in September. The following was a commentary I found on the internet but unfortunately I didn't keep the source so I can't give proper attribution. Ultimately, it is mostly a summary of what is in a chapter of H.L. Mencken's 1921 essay "The American Language' It seems to me to be a pretty good abstract, so I wanted to share it with you.

What, in general, are the differences between British and American spelling, and why do they exist?

In the US many nouns become verbs by adding -ize (e.g., standardize). These same words usually end in -ise in Britain, despite the British dictionaries which show -ize as the main form with -ise as an alternative. One consistency is the American -yze words (analyze) are all -yse in Britain. Sometimes words in British and American

One of the most rewarding things to me about the car hobby is hearing owners' stories about their automotive experiences. Sometimes these stories are funny, sometimes painful, and, well, sometimes just heart warming. This is one of those stories.

During our 2006 Concours we had this beautifully restored 1954 XK 120 on the field from Carlisle, PA. This was the number one JCNA car in its class. Perhaps you saw the car and met Joan and Tom Wolf the owners. The XK 120 was not over restored as is often the case these days but rather brought back to what it must have been like the day it left the showroom floor so many years ago. I had the pleasure of meeting Joan and Tom Wolf at dinner the evening before our concours and spoke with them again on Sunday but we did not have much time to chat as everyone was getting their cars ready for judging. What a pleasant surprise, several weeks later, to see their car on the field at the Hilton Head Concours d Elegance. I was not involved in judging this class at Hilton Head that year but I was not at all surprised to see their XK 120 come forward to the judge's stand to receive its Best in Class award.

Here is where the story really begins. Ed Lucas, the Master of Ceremonies for the

Hilton Head, Amelia Island, and Meadow Brook Concours, has a wonderful way of interviewing the owners of each winning car as it is presented to the crowd and receives its award. He asked Joan how long they had owned the car and she said that it had been purchased new by her Dad. He taught her how to drive it when she was a high school teenager. When it did not run well her boyfriend would come over and help her Dad get it going again. The boyfriend became her husband and the car eventually passed into their possession. Joan went on to tell the crowd that the XK 120 was by then in need of a complete restoration and for many years became known as their "Someday Car" as other family obligations came first. To the delight of everyone on this marvelous warm and sunny fall afternoon the "Someday Car" was now restored to its former glory for all to see and enjoy as it happily motored forward to receive its well-deserved award. I know that this story has been repeated in many different ways with many different Jaguar enthusiasts, some of them in our own club. It speaks to the timeless beauty of Jaguar cars, the important family ties and memories that they can create, and the passion of its owners to the marque. This heritage is something many car companies can only wistfully dream about

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Whye Do Those Brits Spell Wordes the Waye Theye Do?

English are identical in meaning but spelled differently: for example sulfur / sulphur, or hemoglobin / haemoglobin.

Most words (taken from the French) in Britain ending in -our end in -or in the US (color / colour); most words in Britain ending in -tre end in -ter in the US (center / centre). The trend in American spelling is to drop letters that are not needed in a word, such as the u in "colour." The US has a greater tendency to drop silent consonants and vowels, and move to a more phonetic spelling, especially where the old spelling was a French remnant (tyre / tire).

The irregular form is generally more common in British English and the regular form is more common to American English for these verbs: burnt, burned; dreamt, dreamed; learnt, learned; smelt, smelled; spelt, spelled; spilt, spilled; spoilt, spoiled. Licence / license are both valid in the US, but in Britain the former is the noun, the latter the verb (same for practice / practise).

A good dictionary will indicate both American and British spellings when there is a difference. Why do the differences exist? Well, America chose to differentiate itself from Britain from its beginnings; spelling was included in that. You can read more in H.L. Mencken's essay from The American Language (New York: Bartleby, 2000, 2nd ed). The essay itself may be found online at essay from The American Language at www.bartleby.com.

Noah Webster, whose Blue Back Speller (1788) sold 82 million copies within a century of its publication, was a great pioneer of US English as opposed to British English. He said that establishing a national language was as important as winning the American Revolution itself. The spelling of such terms as "theater" instead of "theatre" and "color" instead of "colour" is Webster's legacy.


