
Annual Business Meeting set for November 10th


Fall Drive Set For Sunday, October 28th

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


NGJC Fall Slalom Fun

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Road Trip: Studebaker National Museum

On a recent August vacation trip through the "Crossroads of America" and beyond into the heart of "Michiana", I had the good fortune to spend some time in South Bend. Of course, when you are in South Bend one of the stops should be the extensive collection of the Studebaker National Museum, not far from downtown SoBe. Peggy Davis and I took an afternoon to explore this collection and I thoroughly enjoyed seeing so many of these orphan cars.



The Museum has 120 vehicles in the collection.

The collection includes the Studebaker Corporation's "original collection" of 37 vehicles that were given to the City of South Bend in 1966. The Museum displays approximately 70 vehicles at any time, with an additional 40 vehicles kept in "visible storage" in the Museum's lower level. The collection features several one-of-a-kind vehicles including the 1956 Packard Predictor and the 1934 Bendix SWC.

Firstly, I was surprised to learn more of the history of the Studebaker brothers going back to horse-and-buggy days. They were the suppliers of coaches to several presidents including President Lincoln's Barouche which he took to Ford's Theater the night of his assassination. The Studebaker brothers built hundreds of wagons for the North during the Civil War and by the time the United States was 100 years old, the Studebaker Brothers Manufacturing Company was the largest producer of horsedrawn vehicles in the world.

They entered the automobile business in 1902, when they introduced an electric car and two years later brought out their first gasoline automobile, a two-cylinder, 16-horsepower touring car. Into the teens and twenties they manufactured transports with generic names like Big Six, Light Six, Special Six and Standard Six. By 1927 they introduced more recognizable names to most of us, like President, Commander and Dictator. During these years, automobile manufacturing was shifted from Detroit to South Bend.

The company's fortunes went through many ups and downs during the ensuing years, including being brought out of receivership during the Great Depression, expanding into commercial trucks in the thirties, contributing to the war effort in WWII producing military trucks, aircraft engines, plus cargo and personnel carriers including the Weasel--one version of which was amphibious. Studebaker combined with Packard in '54 but had a hard time competing with the big three of Detroit and the Packard line ended in 1958. Production of all cars in South Bend ended in 1963 but continued in Hamilton, Ontario. That operation proved unprofitable and eventually led to the last Studebaker being produced on March 17, 1966.

Only the Avanti continued on under the Avanti Motor Corporation manufacturing, not a replica, but the Avanti II, a continuation of the original Studebaker model, only with Corvette engines, since Studebaker engine production was discontinued.

There were too many cars to detail in this space, so if you're interested, you'll just have to go there. Information is available at http://www.studebakermuseum.org and there is usually something interesting in the changing displays at the Center for History Museum that shares the same building. When we were there, we enjoyed the "Gizmos, Corsets and Concoctions" exhibit showing what people have been willing to imbibe, don and endure as interesting "cure-alls" in the name of health and beauty.

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
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



QR Code (abbreviated from Quick Response Code) is the trademark for a type of matrix barcode first designed for the automotive industry. More recently, the system has become popular outside the industry due to its fast readability and large storage capacity compared to standard UPC barcodes. The code consists of black modules (square dots) arranged in a square pattern on a white background. With a smart phone app. you can scan and link directly to our NGJC website.



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The program is intended to be permanent, but eligible vehicles and amounts will be examined quarterly and adjusted as necessary. This will ensure that as inventory is exhausted and new cars are launched, the program will apply to the Jaguars currently available.

Watch your mailbox. Jaguar will send all eligible JCNA members a letter to announce the program. The letter will include a certificate number denoting your eligibility.
