Storage of Antique Cars

Editor's note: These are the notes provided to attendees of our August Tech Session conducted by Terry Hulsey and Robbie Farris, so if you missed out on this great info, here's the summary version

Real car guys ultimately just want to drive their beauties. However, there are times when life creates situations which prevent you from doing the things you enjoy the most. During those times, how will you protect your car from the idleness that has been forced upon it? Furthermore, is it actually important to do anything special when storing your car? We are going to answer those questions for you today.

A car can be divided into several systems and that is how we are going to cover preparation for storage.

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Cowboys and Wickets – Western States Jaguar Event 2008.

When I think of Colorado, I think of cool green snow capped mountains with fresh mountain streams, Coors Beer and John Denver Songs. Grand Junction, Colorado is not like this. If you arrive by car from the South as we did, it suddenly appears as a small green valley in a landscape of tortured red and grey rocks that look like a geologist's dream. The town is surrounded by mountains but not the kind portrayed in the songs. The sandstone peaks to the North are not green but grey, and to the south lies the Colorado National Monument, a national park that includes some the most unusual rock formations on the planet which seem to change color and shape each time you look at them.

We arrived at the Grand Junction Doubletree Hotel on Sunday afternoon, the day before official registration for the Western States Event was to begin. As many members of our local Jaguar club, who sponsored the 2005 Challenge Championship know, it takes a lot of work and planning to put on a national event, and many things can go wrong at the last minute. With only hours to go until the start of the event, we

found the core group of the Rocky Mountain Jaguar Club just putting the finishing touches on the display items in the hospitality suite and looking remarkably calm. We joined them that evening for dinner at a very nice restaurant in a newly restored area of downtown Grand Junction. Our XK8 was feeling closer to its British roots as we navigated the newly installed roundabouts that seem to be a core planning item of the downtown restoration.

Our company had agreed not only to sponsor but to help set up the slalom event so Monday afternoon found us scouting out the site chosen by the Rocky Mountain event planners. The parking lot had to be shared with patrons of the city swimming pool but we were able to measure and mark out the course. Somehow we managed to pick the hottest time of the day with temperatures in the high 90s, another thing we hadn't expected of Colorado. Our only consolation was that the slalom was scheduled for eight a.m. the next morning and we were hoping we would be finished before the real heat of the day and before the local swimmers would fill up the remaining parts of the parking lot. Happy hour was in full force by the time we returned to the hotel so we joined in to meet some new friends and re-connect with those we had not seen since the last national Jaguar event.

Six a.m. came very early the next morning and after setup, registration, and tech inspection, we were ready to start timed runs for the slalom just after eight. The city

of Grand Junction had provided the cones for the slalom, barriers and caution tape to block off the parking lot, and even threw in some tents for shade. Rob and Allie von Westenberg provided the real shade with their giant tow truck and traveling garage which, in addition to three cars, contained another huge tent and even an electric fan to keep the scorekeepers cool and comfortable.

About twenty drivers registered for the slalom and we were able to complete the official timed runs by about ten-thirty. The local Jaguar dealer had provided two new XF sedans to be test driven by attendees of the Western States Event so we figured that the slalom would definitely be a good place to test this new model. We considered this a pretty good consolation prize as we were not able to bring our slalom prepared XKE to Colorado for the event. Dick Maury managed to turn in the best time of the day driving the XF so I guess you could say the test drive went well. Just as the sun was getting really hot in the parking lot, the caterers arrived with box lunches for everyone, much more classy than the barbeque joint where we usually end up after our local slalom.

Later that afternoon we boarded several buses and headed for the Colorado River. Several large rafts, each with a local guide, had been reserved for a leisurely float down the river, a great place to see some wildlife, and I don't mean the kind that were in the rafts. Several vans picked us up at the end of the raft trip and transported us back to where we had started for a genuine western barbeque and then some

reserved seats for the weekly local rodeo. These cowboys were the real thing from local ranches including bull riders and calf ropers. Even the local kids got involved with sheep riding. Now this was more like the Colorado we had expected!

Wednesday morning started early with the timed rally that included a route through the Colorado National Monument Park. How anyone could keep their eyes on the road and on the stopwatch with all the breathtaking scenery is a mystery to me. Since Jim Anderson and Dick Maury were driving our XK8 in the rally, I managed to snag a ride in one of the XF sedans and even got to drive it around some really fun curvy roads, only slightly frightening my passenger. The rally and tour ended at the Two Rivers Winery for a very sumptuous lunch, with wine and champagne tasting, of course. The tour book for Grand Junction states that the area actually has seventeen wineries. I felt it was my duty as a tourist to try to taste as many of the local wines as possible.

Late that afternoon we once again took a bus ride, this time south to visit the



Gateway Canyons Resort and Colorado Auto Museum. The auto collection contained everything from a Duisenberg to sixties muscle cars all very tastefully displayed in a large climate controlled warehouse. The trip included dinner on the lawn of the resort where we were once again surrounded by the amazing scenery.

If we thought we were getting up early each morning so far, Thursday morning proved us wrong. The scheduled event for the morning was sunrise breakfast which took us once more into the Colorado National Monument. Even though it was still semi-dark when we left the hotel, the line of Jaguars climbing curvy mountain roads was quite impressive. An area near the visitor center afforded a perfect view of one of the more photographed features in the park and was quite breathtaking as the sun rose and the morning light reflected on the rock pinnacles. Once the sun had risen, a catered breakfast complete with white tablecloths and fresh flowers finished off the event perfectly.

The Thursday afternoon event might seem a bit unusual but apparently is a tradition among the members of the Rocky Mountain Jaguar Club. It seems that about fifteen years ago someone in the club decided that a proper croquet match would be a perfect compliment to concours events and so a tradition was born. Of course, in order to be proper, one must dress all in white and be drinking champagne while smashing the balls through the wickets. Who knows, this just might become a national tradition.

The only exceptions must be approved by the Chief Judge.

WHAT IS IT? Our Concours d'Elegance is a show for everyone. You belong to our club because you have a Jaguar (or more) and are proud of it. This is our biggest event of the year and any and all Jaguars are welcome from very old to very new. The options are all yours. You can enter your car to be judged in one of three main classes, as a display only (brunch included) or just come, park your car, and enjoy the event. Like I mentioned above, this is not just our local car show, this is a nationally sanctioned JCNA Concours and cars from other clubs all over the East and Southeast will be there including some of the top cars in the country.

If you are thinking about entering your car for judging in one of the many classes let me try to briefly explain how that works. Cars are judged for authenticity, cleanliness and condition. There are three main Divisions. In Champion Division we judge the entire vehicle including the engine compartment and trunk (boot). In the Driven Division we judge only the exterior and interior of the car. There is a third division called Special which includes cars that have been significantly modified for street or track racing or are replicas of original Jaguars. Now, each of these divisions are divided into classes basically the model and year group of the car. So, XJ6 cars compete only against other XJ6 cars. This makes everything fair.

THE SCHEDULE: This is a one day event but we are going to start a bit early by meeting the out of town entrants on Saturday evening for dinner at one of the local Gainesville venues. You are more than welcome to attend – Please let me know so I can make the reservations. On Sunday, the Chattahoochee Country Club gates will be open at 9:00am. You have from then to do any final prepping on you car until 11:30 when brunch will be served. We will then call "rags down" at 1:00pm and judging will begin. The score sheets will then be tallied and awards presented at 3:30. This year we will also have a People's Choice Award and each person with a brunch ticket will get to vote on the car of their choice (but not their own of course).

WHAT DO I NEED TO DO? So, if you are planning to attend and thinking about entering your Jag (we hope you do) what do you need to do to prepare it? Think of it this way. Each car starts off with a perfect score (meaning it looks like it did the day it was made). The judges then make deductions for (1) anything they find non-authentic on the car (2) poor condition such as dents, rust, paint chips and (3) cleanliness. Can you guess what the "biggie" here

is?....Cleanliness. Typically I see more points deducted for this than anything else and, do you know what? This is something you can fix yourself, in your driveway, for next to no cost. If you enter your car in a Driven Division class you need not worry about cleaning the engine or boot as they are not judged.

If this all sounds a bit complicated (it really isn't) you may want to just enter your car in Display Only. That

way you can experience the Concours, have a fantastic brunch, and enjoy the camaraderie our club is famous for. So why not take this opportunity to give that car you love its annual best cleaning and polishing ever and bring it out to the CCC.

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Storage of Antique Cars

Mechanical

This includes all the engine, transmission, and rear end parts. It also takes in such things as springs and throttle linkages. The first thing we want to do is change the oil and filter. We also want to make sure the other fluids are at the correct levels. Every grease fitting should be greased, and the fitting wiped clean. Any leaks that can be corrected should be taken care of now. All linkages are oiled and checked for binding. Clutches are adjusted, as are brakes. Finally, everything is cleaned.

Pressure washers work very well for cleaning mechanical components, but it is very important to be sure ALL water is dried off after finishing. Remember that polished aluminum, carbs, and electrical components should be avoided.

Interior

This is not just the area that holds the passengers; it also includes the boot (trunk). All leather and vinyl should be thoroughly cleaned and then protected with a conditioner. Carpet should be shampooed if necessary and then vacuumed. If you have access to compressed air, you can use a rubber tipped air blower to blow any dust and dirt out of crevices and carpet before you vacuum. Glass gauge faces should be washed with window cleaner. Chrome can be cleaned with household cleaner applied to a rag and then waxed. If you can find it, stain preventer should be applied to any cloth surface.

Exterior

Everything on the outside of the car-including all chrome, lights, paint, and convertible tops. A thorough washing is the first order of business. After drying everything, every square inch of the vehicle needs to be closely examined for damage. If there are any paint chips, now is the time to touch them up. Rusty chrome can be cleaned with chrome polish and waxed, but the only real cure is to re-chrome the part. After all that is done, the entire outer surface should be covered with protectants: wax on the paint and chrome, Rain-X on all glass, and a fabric or vinyl dressing on tops.

Short-term Storage

Short-term is defined as one month or less. Inflate tires to 5 pounds above normal. Try to have only a gallon or two of gas in the tank. Park the car on a level surface, cover, and walk away.

Long-term Storage

Over one month. Inflate tires to 5 pounds above normal. Fill the gas tank and add Sta-Bil. (Sta-Bil lasts approximately 1 year in a tank.) Jack the car up and place jack stands under the suspension. Disconnect the fuel pump and run the car until the carbs are dry. Remove the battery(s). Remove the spark plugs and squirt a little oil down each cylinder. Drain the cooling system and refill with fresh coolant (NEVER just water!).

Plug the exhaust with a rag or rubber cork. Pests make their presence known in the most unexpected places by the damage they leave behind. Avoid problems by placing moth balls in the interior to prevent moth damage. Invest in mousetraps and circle the car with them. The traps will have to be checked periodically so make arrangements to do this. Cover and walk away.

Storage Conditions

The best conditions for storage have a level area, are humidity and temperature controlled, and dark. Sunlight bleaches out colors and weakens fabrics over a period of time. Convertibles should always be stored with the top up and windows closed.

Important Notes

After a lot of thought and consulting with experts in the field, I have come to the conclusion that only high test gasoline should be used in antique cars. The reasons are these: First, many antiques have either high compression (muscle cars) or a combustion chamber shape (Jags) which does not like to run on regular gas and will eventually cause engine damage. Second, pre-WWII antiques originally ran on gasoline that was only a little above our kerosene. This meant that the fuel burned



slowly. High-test gasoline best duplicates this slow burn. I have tried this in my own cars and find they run cooler and better.

Modern motor oils no longer contain adequate amounts of Zync (ZDDP). This additive was not used until post-war... therefore, for pre-war cars this is not critical. However, in post-war cars, engine damage can and will occur. ZDDP prevents damage between parts that are rotating under high pressure such as lifters on cam shafts. The lack of ZDDP can cause the lobes to be worn off the cams in a very short time. ZDDP is available as a separate additive at local Pep Boys, O'Reilly's, NAPA, and other parts stores. It is my understanding there are also some stores that carry oil meant for antiques that still contain ZDDP.
